# Important **People Overview**



### International Education Office

The International Education office is located at Riverside Centre (20575 Thorne Ave.) The staff in the office can assist you with questions about international student trips, health insurance, and many other questions you might have. The Homestay Coordinators are also in this office. International students are always welcome to come to our office.



#### **International Liaison Teacher**


The International Liaison teacher at your school is responsible to support international students with any academic questions or concerns.

#### **Host Family**

Your host family is an important part of your study abroad experience. They are there to support you and provide you with a caring and safe place to live. They can help you to understand life in Canada.

#### **Homestay Coordinator**

Your homestay coordinator is the staff member in the International Education office who placed you with your host family. They are responsible for helping you with any concerns you have regarding homestay. If you are having difficulty communicating or have questions about living in Canada they are able to help you. Your homestay coordinator will be at your school 1 day a week and will contact you to check in and see how you are doing.





If you want to get a cell phone when you are here in Canada there are many choices. The main cell phone providers are **Rogers**, **Telus**, **Bell** and **Fido**. You should sign up for a *prepaid plan* and not a monthly plan. Homestay parents cannot sign your contracts. There are some companies that work with international students such as **PhoneBox**, that might be able to provide more options.





#### **Banking**

Depending on your age and length of stay in Canada you might be able to open a international student bank account. The major banks in the Maple Ridge - Pitt Meadows area:

Bank of Montreal (BMO)

**Toronto Dominon (TD)** 

Royal Bank (RBC)

#### Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC)

Each bank has different requirements to open an account it usually will require your passport and study permit. Your host family can help you to contact the banks and find out what the requirements are. Homestay parents cannot sign any documents on your behalf.







#### **Academic Expectations**

During your new student orientation you will be required to agree to the *International Education department's Code of Conduct.* 

#### **School Attendance**

An important part of being successful in school is to not miss class. You are expected to attend school every day. If you are feeling sick please tell your host family and they will contact the school to excuse you.

#### **Expectations**

- I will respectfully and responsibly represent the International Education Program and my school.
- I will inform the school of any absences. I will not miss an extended number of classes or leave before the end of the official school year/term.
- I will strive to pass all of my classes, and progress to the best of my ability.
- I will not travel without completing and submitting the necessary documents, and understand that I must obtain official permission and be supervised by a responsible adult over the age of 25.
- I will not drive or operate a vehicle in Canada as long as I am a student in the SD42 International Education Program.

#### **Code of Conduct** Secondary Program

Abide by the laws of British Columbia, Canada and your home country

Abide by host school code of conduct (accessible via school websites)

Treat fellow students and school staff with respect at all times

Attend all classes and required activities (do not incur unexcused absences)

Be punctual

Practice academic honesty and demonstrate sincere effort on assigned work

Complete assignments on time and seek help when needed

Respect homestay rules – When away from home on free time, let host family know where you will be and provide contact details

Do not buy, sell or use alcohol or possess intoxicants (including marijuana)

Do not get any body piercings and/or tattoos





#### Curfew

It is important to speak with your host family about what time you need to be home. Your curfew will probably be different from your friend's who is at a different host family. If you have questions about curfews you can speak with your host family or homestay coordinator.

#### **Expectations**

In your homestay you will have your own room with a bed, desk, closet and a window. Your host family will also make sure you have breakfast, lunch and dinner. In Canada, it is common for breakfast to be self-serve and cold, such as cereal, fruits and yogurt. For lunch, students usually make their own like sandwiches or take some left overs from the previous dinner. Dinner is usually the biggest meal of the day, and a time you will sit down with your host family and have a meal together.

#### Communication

Communicating with your host family is an important part of a successful homestay experience. There are many ways you can keep in touch like sending a text message or calling them. Face to face is always the best. You should always ask your host family's permission if you would like to go out with friends or invite people to your homestay.





### **Metro Vancouver**



#### Weather



The Vancouver area has 4 seasons, Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer. Fall temperatures are usually around 19 degrees to 5 degrees and is from September to mid December. September is warmer and sunnier and then the weather gets darker and it begins to rain. Winter is from mid December to mid March usually around 10 to 0 degrees with only a few days below 0 and usually 2 or 3 days of snow. It rains in the winter so it is a good idea to have appropriate clothing. Spring is from mid March to mid June and is usually between 10 to 20 degrees. In the beginning it is still rainy but gradually gets sunnier closer to June.

#### **Clothing**

You should ensure you have warm clothing and some waterproof outerwear. In the late fall and winter you will need some warm tops and outerwear and in the late spring some t-shirts. Anything you are missing you can purchase at the local shopping malls or on a weekend shopping trip to downtown Vancouver!

#### **Transportation**

There is easy access to public transit in the Maple Ridge - Pitt Meadows area. Most students will take the public bus to school and on the weekends you have easy access to other areas in Metro Vancouver where you can find many shopping malls, restaurants, tourist attractions and much more. #### **Trips and Excursions**



#### **Medical Forms**

All international students studying in our school district are covered by medical insurance arranged by our department. The type of medical insurance you have will depends on how long you are studying with us. Students studying with us for 5 months or less will be placed on comprehensive private insurance called StudyInsured. Students studying 6 months or longer will be placed on BC government MSP insurance with top up coverage from StudyInsured. # **Community** *Access*

There are many different activities available in the Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows area. You can go to the local recreation centre to swim, workout or participate in other activities. Our area has many different parks and hiking trails that students can go to along with many other outdoor activities. There are various small shopping centres, restaurants and cafes you can hang out with your friends when you are not in school.







#### **General Safety Tips**

B.C. is generally a very safe place to live. It is still important to be aware of your surroundings and follow some general safety tips:

- Never open your door to strangers
- Make sure that doors and windows are securely locked at night or when you leave
- Tell your host family where you are going and what time you will be home
- Travel with a friend whenever you can
- Plan ahead and get directions to where you are going before you leave home
- Make sure to keep all valuables such as passport, credit cards and wallet in a safe and secure place
- Program emergency telephone numbers and contact information for your homestay family and school into your phone

#### Stay Visible

- When walking on the streets, cross the street at crosswalks and follow pedestrian signs and traffic signals (never cross if signal is yellow or red), never assume a car driver can see you, make yourself visible, especially when dark outside
- If you are bicycling, you must wear a helmet by law, stay where drivers can see you, wear reflective clothing and use lights when dark out

# Travel without Host Family

#### Day & Overnight Trips

Students traveling outside the Metro Vancouver area overnight must have an adult 25 years of age or older accompanying them at all times.


Final decision about a travel request rests with the Maple Ridge – Pitt Meadows International Program Office. The explanation, "My parents says it's ok" will not be accepted.

If travel will result in missed classes, students must talk to their teachers and International Liaison directly as well as receive approval from the International Program Office.

A Travel Application is needed for both overnight and single day travel outside of the Metro Vancouver area.

If students are traveling overnight outside of the Metro Vancouver area, natural parents must sign the parental acknowledgment. Please note the final decision about a travel request is with the International Program Office.

Students may travel with their parents, but the International Program Office must be notified.



#### **Travel Regulations**

International students are required to remain in the Metro Vancouver area and are not permitted to travel to any other city without approval from the International Program Office. Students who wish to travel outside Metro Vancouver must apply to the International Program Office for permission and must do the following:

- Complete ALL information on the Travel Application Form, they can be obtained from your homestay coordinator or downloaded on our website
- The form must be returned to your homestay coordinator via email or in person and must be received at least 5 days prior to the desired travel date.
   If the complete information has not been given travel may not be approved.
- The responsible homestay coordinator will contact the host family to inform them if travel has or has not been approved.

#### **Travel with Host Family**

- If a student is traveling with their host family outside of the Metro Vancouver area and within British Columbia no travel application is required.
- Host families must inform their homestay coordinator prior to travel and provide all information.

#### Travel to the USA with or without Host Family:

- A Travel Application must be completed and by signed by the student's natural parents.
- For travel to the USA, students must ensure they have the correct VISA and carry their StudyInsured Medical Information at all times.
